

ASTHMA TRIGGERS

Asthma attacks can be caused by something that bothers the lungs. This is called an asthma trigger. There are many kinds of asthma triggers. The most common are:

- ◆ Secondhand (cigarette) smoke
- ◆ Cockroaches
- ◆ Dust mites
- ◆ Molds
- ◆ Pets/other animals

Americans spend up to 90% of their time indoors. Contact with indoor allergens and irritants may play an important role in triggering asthma episodes.

It is important to learn which triggers are a problem for you or your child. Once asthma triggers are known, you can take action to prevent asthma attacks.

You can help avoid asthma attacks by cutting down exposure to your triggers. When attacks occur, they will probably be less severe.

Putting on AIRS helps you find what may be making your asthma worse. With your permission, trained staff check your home for things that trigger asthma attacks.



Who Will Check my Home for asthma triggers?

A health educator and an environmental health specialist visit your home. They go over their findings with you. They make suggestions to help you control your or your child's asthma.
